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Participation in Potter Yachter Sailing Events

Recommended Gear and Safety Equipment Guidelines

For Potter Yachter sails, we recommend that you bring the necessary gear in working order to ensure that you are able to control your vessel under the conditions at hand. We further suggest that you bring sufficient safety equipment to deal with adverse circumstances and meet applicable laws and United States Coast Guard regulations. Our guidelines for gear and safety equipment include (but are not limited to) the following:

- 1. U.S.C.G. approved Personal Flotation Device for each person (Type I, II, III, or V)
- 2. U.S.C.G. approved Visual Distress Signals (e.g. flares, etc.)
- 3. U.S.C.G. approved efficient Sound-Producing Device (e.g. Air Horn, etc.)
- 4. U.S.C.G. approved B-1 type hand portable fire extinguisher, properly secured
- 5. U.S.C.G. approved throwable device (e.g. boat cushion, ring or horseshoe buoy)
- 6. Working Motor (with sufficient clean gas)
- 7. Tow Line (150 feet)
- 8. Marine VHF Radio
- 9. Anchor, chain, and 250 feet of line, sufficient to secure the vessel
- 10. First Aid Kit
- 11. Manual Bilge Pump and Bailing Bucket

Sailing can be a dangerous activity so please be careful, be prepared, and be safe.

Caveat: The Potter Yachters are an informal, non-litigious, sailing club. Therefore, participation in any Potter Yachter event constitutes agreement to assume the risk of injury or damages arising out of that event as it concerns the Potter Yachters and their members, and an agreement to waive any claims against the club and its members relating thereto. Richmond Sail (generally intermediate, but depends on the destination and the weather; we may sail to Angel Island or north to San Rafael depending on the tides, but the closer we get to the Golden Gate or going out the Golden Gate, we are talking advanced; but mostly individuals decide for themselves on getting the feel of the conditions);

March 19-20 Redwood City (St Pat's Sail) Dave Kautz

RSVP for Corned Beef & Cabbage Friday night at the docks at Westpoint - contact Westpoint Harbor to get a slip Friday night. Leaving Redwood City launch ramp around 10am on Saturday to anchor in the South Bay that night. Return to launch ramp Sunday. Easy to Intermediate sail depending on wind. Be prepared to spend the night at anchor.

April 1-3 Benecia to Napa Goose

Depending on wind and tides, this can be an intermediate sail. Launch in Benecia and sail to Napa. Two nights at the Napa Valley Marina, a visit to Napa on Saturday, followed by a sail back to Benecia on Sunday.

April 9-10 Rio Vista Gerry Nolan

Depending on wind and tides, this can be an intermediate sail. Launch in Rio Vista and sail to Antioch via Three Mile Slough and the San Joaquin River. Overnight in Antioch. Return to Rio Vista via Broad Slough and the Sacramento.



Start out your year of sailing with an overnight at the Richmond Yacht Harbor. Last year this turned out to be a great day on the water. Yours truly even got a photo in Latitude 38! I will set up and most likely do an afternoon sail on Friday. Tides are very favorable with a morning ebb and afternoon flood on both Sat. and Sun. Possible destinations include: Angel Island docks, circumnavigation of Angel Island, or Sam's Anchor Cafe in Tiburon. Regroup at Richmond for a dock party and dinner. Depending on the weather, I will pull out on either Sunday afternoon or Monday morning. Contact the Marina Bay Yacht Harbor early to get a slip. Proof of liability insurance is required. Directions to Redwood City Boat Ramp Get on Highway 101 headed for Redwood City:

- take exit 408 Woodside Road/Seaport Blvd.
- take Seaport Blvd. (east towards the Bay)
- continue on Seaport Blvd. thru the stoplight
- turn left on Chesapeake Drive
- follow it to the end where there will be a parking lot on your left and the ramp with the permit dispenser on your right.
- Park in the lot, pay the \$5 ramp fee and leave the receipt on the dash in your car with the trailer and you're good for the day. We've been buying additional tickets for every 24 hours we're parked. That seems to be acceptable.



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April Fool's Benicia-Napa Weekend. 4/1-4/3. Last spring 14 boats enjoyed a stellar outing sailing into wine country, and it would be foolish not to return. Launch at Benicia Marina 5th street ramp on Friday, sail, dine, and overnight at the Benecia Marina. (Follow the link to make reservations) Saturday morning depart 9-10ish slack tide, and catch the flood up to Napa Valley Marina for early afternoon arrival. Beautiful and protected waters, usually in 8-12k reaching conditions. We have again reserved the guest dock adjacent to the fascinating "boatyard of broken dreams," and will probably have a dockside pizza party..

Sunday morning return to Benicia; catching the end of the ebb (low 10:20) for a glorious downwinder onto the Carquinez Strait as we pick up the flood tide at the confluence of San Pablo Bay./Mare Island Strait. Those who want to launch Saturday morning can also splash at the 9th street park ramp, and meet up on the water. About 20 miles/4-6hours each way, in amazing surroundings.

<u>Directions</u> to 9th Street Ramp, Benicia From I-680:

Exit onto I-780 West towards Benicia Exit at Military East

Stay along water until 9th

From I-80:

Exit onto I-780 East towards Benicia Exit at Southampton Rd Head toward water (veering by Taco Bell) Turn Right immediately onto W. K St. Turn Left onto W. 9th St.

To Benicia Marina:

Exit 5th Street and ramp is at end of 5th.

Marina office for check-in is on 2nd Street.



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Come Sail the Delta!

Upcoming: Delta Sail April 8-9 Sail Host: Gerry Nolan



Apr 9 (Sat) Rio Vista is a two day sail to Antioch Marina, via Three Mile Slough and the San Joaquin River along the east side of Sherman Island. Three Mile Slough will require a bridge opening where coordination of the fleet will be important. Approximate 15 mile down river course with a 10 AM Saturday departure. Overnight at the Antioch Marina, where Potter's will need to make prior arrangements for slips, keys and showers by contacting the Antioch Marina.

Rio Vista city launch ramp provides parking (\$15 first day includes launch and parking; Sunday is a \$5 charge). Departure back to Rio Vista will be Sunday, April 10, 10 AM departure from Antioch direct, west of Sherman Island and up the Sacramento River. Pay-as-you go Saturday 6 PM dinner at world famous Humphrey, (no longer Humphrey) now Smith's Landing. Charts and course materials will be provided.

Directions to the public boat ramp in Rio Vista:

- -From Antioch, Take Hwy 160 north to Hwy 12 west
- -From Hwy 5, go towards Lodi then take Hwy 12 west
- *Once on Hwy 12 west, continue over Rio Vista Bridge, then follow signs to Downtown Rio Vista making a hairpin turn right onto Hwy 84, and immediate right at N Front St., continue until Montezuma Street and turn left toward ramp.
- -From the West, take Hwy 680 or Hwy 80 toward Fairfield, then take Hwy 12 east. *Once on Hwy 12 east, continue until N Front St (Just before the Rio Vista Bridge) and continue on N Front St., then go until Montezuma Street and turn left toward ramp.

This was the first Bridges sail that didn't stop any land traffic, that's because it didn't go under any bridges. Most boats, all ten of them, arrived on Friday. 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Report: Annual Meeting Members Gather at OYC

The annual meeting of the Potter Yachters convened on December 12th, 2021 at the Oakland Yacht Club in Alameda. Once again, OYC graciously offered us the use of the Regatta Room, and although Covid concerns eliminated their usual Brunch service, they allowed us to bring in Pizza for lunch. Everyone presented acceptable evidence of vaccination and we all wore masks.



Commodore 'Goose' Gossman opened the meeting with welcoming remarks and new member introductions. Then he gave a short Commodore's report which lauded the fact that we completed 14 sailing events even through the Covid times. He stressed the importance of using the "buddy system" out there. We can see from new member applications that some folks have limited experience, while on the other hand, more experienced sailors might enjoy having crew sometimes. One of the benefits of being associated with the club is having people you can call to go sailing together, either as crew on another's boat or single-handed on multiple boats. The Potters have a history of being very supportive of one another and helping out. He summed up his report with, "I've been with the club for over 20 years and as new members join, it's really important that we keep doing what we're doing."


With that, Goose handed it over to Vice Commodore Phil Marcelis for a discussion of something that has come up numerous times without much traction; the issue of whether to incorporate the club as a 501c7 mutual benefit organization. He brought up the concerns of liability that coordinating sailing events entails and recalled the interactions with organizers from other yacht clubs regarding waivers. Additionally, he presented the results of inquiries into getting insurance through US Sailing. Carl offered the suggestion that everyone sign a one-time liability waiver, for instance when they become a member, and this should also be done by anyone who happens to be a guest of a member (parents would sign for children). After the discussion, the question of incorporating was put to a vote and unanimously approved. The officers will get the paperwork together and draft bylaws which will be posted to the website for review around February or March. We should have everything finalized by April. Next to a vote was the question of raising dues to \$50 per year to pay for insurance, and it was likewise unanimously approved.

At that point, George Corrigan got up and presented the interim treasurer's report with data from May – when the checking account balance was transferred over – up until November. After all the inflows and outflows were calculated, we're happy to know that the club is still solvent.

There was a motion by Dave Candey that after we incorporate, we join PICYA. It seems that a lot of options open up when we incorporate. It's required for the club to join US Sailing, makes it easier to get insurance, and it's a prerequisite for joining organizations like PICYA that would offer reciprocal privileges for our members. After a short discussion, the motion was changed to "consider joining PICYA" and it was quickly seconded and passed unanimously.

As lunchtime was getting nearer, Goose presented the proposed Slate of Officers and called for a vote. The full slate passed unanimously.

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Goose handed out several awards to recognize beneficial Potter traits. This included the Potter Yachter of the Year Award (reported elsewhere in this issue), and:

- the Seamanship Award to Phil Marcelis, for lending a kedge anchor to a stuck boater and floating a 150' line to a tired paddler struggling against the current to get to happy hour.
- the Good Shepherd Award to Kevin Crowder, for taking a new member under his wing in the Moss Landing to Monterey sail and showing him the ropes
- the Night Rider Award to David & Sharon Soule for driving from Nevada (often leaving early Friday evenings) to make it to so many of the club sailing events.
- the Wingman Award to George & Rebecca Corrigan for that "got your six" helpfulness.

Pizza and soda was served. A couple of people also brought cookies and other snacks.

George gave a presentation about the Salish 100 trip he did in 2021, and Goose urged everyone to think about giving it a try. Afterwards, Goose went over the proposed sailing calendar, and then we sat for a group photo. The meeting was adjourned at about 1pm, and those who had brought a wrapped present for the gift-exchange went home with a gift. It was another successful Potter Yachters group event.
