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Participation in Potter Yachter Sailing Events

Recommended Gear and Safety Equipment Guidelines

For Potter Yachter sails, we recommend that you bring the necessary gear in working order to ensure that you are able to control your vessel under the conditions at hand. We further suggest that you bring sufficient safety equipment to deal with adverse circumstances and meet applicable laws and United States Coast Guard regulations. Our guidelines for gear and safety equipment include (but are not limited to) the following:

- 1. U.S.C.G. approved Personal Flotation Device for each person (Type I, II, III, or V)
- 2. U.S.C.G. approved Visual Distress Signals (e.g. flares, etc.)
- 3. U.S.C.G. approved efficient Sound-Producing Device (e.g. Air Horn, etc.)
- 4. U.S.C.G. approved B-1 type hand portable fire extinguisher, properly secured
- 5. U.S.C.G. approved throwable device (e.g. boat cushion, ring or horseshoe buoy)
- 6. Working Motor (with sufficient clean gas)
- 7. Tow Line (150 feet)
- 8. Marine VHF Radio
- 9. Anchor, chain, and 250 feet of line, sufficient to secure the vessel
- 10. First Aid Kit
- 11. Manual Bilge Pump and Bailing Bucket

Sailing can be a dangerous activity so please be careful, be prepared, and be safe.

Caveat: The Potter Yachters are an informal, non-litigious, sailing club. Therefore, participation in any Potter Yachter event constitutes agreement to assume the risk of injury or damages arising out of that event as it concerns the Potter Yachters and their members, and an agreement to waive any claims against the club and its members relating thereto. Next was the treasurer's report. We had income related to burgees and dues, and we had various expenses for postage, printing, incorporating, events, website, and our annual donation to a few yacht clubs who are very welcoming to us. After all the inflows and outflows were calculated, we're happy to know that the club is still solvent. The full report, as well as all documents associated with incorporation, are available to any club member upon request.

One note from the treasurer: we have a new bank account after incorporating. Dues should now be made out to "Potter Yachters" and we're not using PayPal right now. We may be able to use Zelle, but we're working on that so in the meantime, please mail a check to Goose made out to "Potter Yachters". It's still \$50 per family.

Following that, the proposed Slate of Director-Officers was presented for a vote. Typically, a corporation will elect several people to form a Board of Directors who will then decide on the few officers. However, our bylaws were written to reflect how we've operated for many years, so our vote is actually for Commodore, Vice-Commodore, and Secretary-Treasurer, each of whom is also a Director. It may be confusing, but the result is the same as it's been for our organization all these years. The officers can then appoint people to various other functions like Newsletter, Webmaster, etc. The full slate passed unanimously. Let's welcome them!

After action report: Delta Bridges 2022



For me, this was a very different Bridges sail. I usually by mid-year have the course and overnight identified and secured. I arranged to have the start and overnight at the Delta Marina in Rio Vista. The Saturday sailing route used the deep-water channel to Miners Slough to Steamboat Slough back to Rio Vista.

Miners Slough requires a 12-hour notification to open the bridge. Starting mid-year, I began calling the head of Delta Bridges to make arrangements. I don't remember how many times I called, but he never answered or returned any of my calls. Mid-October I chickened out and began looking for an alternative route. Whatever I did I had to keep the overnight in Rio Vista. Most options were just too long for a day sail. I decided to go up the Sacramento to the Walnut Grove area and sail back. The problem was finding a place to take a break before we turned around. Art and Lucy Fox pictured below suggested Ko-Ket a public campground with a dock and restaurant on the Sacramento River. They are the folks who follow us around in the pontoon boat. On occasion

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We had a total of 15 boats on this year's sail. Thursday, Dan Phy launched his boat, *Six*. Friday Danny Ward, Larry Tkach, Rob Samson, Ted Tome, Goose, Eric Zilbert, Mark Sabin, Bruce, Janet Dalen, and I all launched. Saturday morning Jon Barber, and Mike Kennedy launched. Sunday David and Sharon Soule, George Wehrfritz, and Bud Newhall launched for the sail around Decker Island.

I have an anemometer at my house, Saturday morning it read 0 mph, average mph 0, and gusts 0 mph. In other words, there wasn't any wind. That held true for most of the day. The Sacramento, unlike the sloughs, is wide enough to sail if there is wind. There was one point several hours into the sail when I saw Eric Zilbert raise his motor and sail at about three knots. Did I mention the tide was against us? I was about to do the same when he dropped his motor and began motor sailing.

The difference was we had a favorable tide, and everyone sailed. The Soules came with yet another boat. I think they have more boats than Goose. It is a Core Sound 17, and it is a beauty. Hats off to Susan, Art, and Lucy. Saturday we all motored, Sunday we sailed **Slowly**, and the pontoon boat stayed with us. I was happy when I got above 2 knots. Eventually, we all made it around Decker Island and back to the Delta Marina. Even without any wind, I think everyone had a good time. I know I did. Next year I promise more bridges.



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
